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A History of All Hallows' Eve

Americans are expected to spend a record-high \$9.1 billion this year on Halloween candy, decorations, and costumes, with superheros, action heroes, and princesses among the most popular dress-up options for kids and witches for adults.



Often lost among the ghoulish celebration is the origin of the holiday, Halloween is based largely on Celtic paganism in the British Isles, and their feast of Samhain, the new year. They believed it was the time when ghosts and spirits came out to haunt, and the Celts would appease the spirits by giving them treats. The feast was celebrated in Ireland, Scotland and Wales, and parts of Britain.

Halloween also has some elements of the Romans celebrating Pomona, the goddess of fruit and trees. That was a harvest feast, thus we bob for apples, for instance.

When Christianity came to Britain. . . it just so happened that November 1 was the Christian Feast of All Saints and the next day is All Soul's Day. October 31 became the Eve of All Saints, or All Hallows' Eve. So the modern practice of Halloween incorporates Christianity and pagan rituals.

In America, the real explosion of Halloween happened when the Irish immigrants came and brought their practice with them. It looked like a really fun thing to do. So other people wanted to do it.

bisexual and transgender calendar. This is GLBT History Month, dedicated to re-discovering our past and celebrating our communities icons October 11 is also **Caitlin'sMr. Chef:** which we observe by taking part in the National Equality March and many local events.

However, the most popular and historic holiday doesn't come until the end of the month. This holiday predates recorded history and captures the essence of sex and gender variance to a much greater degree than the activist holidays. Just open the pages of any gay paper during the first weeks of November and you will see what is doing on October 31st. It's the great gay holiday!"

While Halloween is enjoyed by everyone, it has been the gay community that has most flamboyantly exploited Halloween's potential as a transgressive festival, as one that operates outside or on the margins of orthodox time, space, and hierarchy. Indeed, it is the gay community that has been arguably most responsible for Halloween's adult rejuvenation.

The gay festival par excellence, has been observed by queer people long before there were Pride Days or Coming Out Days; Southern Decadence or Wiglock; bear busts, circuit parties, leather runs, nudist gatherings or women's music festivals. Long before there was Disney, Halloween was and is the original Gay Day.

Halloween has always been a time of year when the gay communities experienced greater freedoms . . . Even the 1940s and 1950s when police harassment of gay bars was at it height, Halloween was the one fairy-tale evening when drag queens could come out with impunity. In *Wide-Open Town: A History of Queer San Francisco to 1965*, historian Nan Boyd wrote about Halloween parties that were held at the Beige Room and other San Francisco bars back in the fifties, which included not simply a drag ball and a parade of queens but the selection of the best dressed participant. In New York City, by the mid-1970s, gay promenades had become a constituent feature of the Greenwich Village Halloween celebrations. Beginning in 1974 as a countercultural event for the Village arts community, this annual parade, with its puppets, floats, and revelers, has become the local gay population's Halloween celebrations.

Halloween's appeal to the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender communities goes beyond that holiday's historical or spiritual connotations. It has a lot to do with our role as outsiders in society; our propensity for cross-dressing and gender-bending; our love for the unusual and fantastic; our ability to find humor in the absurdities and misfortunes of life; our fascination with festive costumes and the world of make-believe; and our special capacity to have fun. While others might treat Halloween as trick or treat for children, LesBiGay and Trans people observe and cherish it as a day and night in which we can do away with dull, ordinary, dumb reality and be our fun, exotic, erotic selves.

So whatever you do on this very special, and very gay night, remember to be careful, to play safe, and to enjoy yourselves. After a few thousand years, we should be able to do it right.

BROTHERS FROM THE PAST

(I am resurrecting this vert interest series written by Cecil Bethea. This one was written in February, 2006).

Billy Bean was born on May 11, 1961, seven months after a precipitously arranged marriage for his parents. The ceremony only guaranteed Bean's legitimacy, not the durability of his parents' union. A year after his birth, his father departed upon a two-year Mormon Mission to Canada. This information comes from Bean's co-authored autobiography, *"Going The Other Way"*.

One of his favorite possessions was a Superman suit he received for his fourth birthday. The Super Hero of afternoon television like Batman and Robin, Popeye, and Superman were the models of his fervid daydreams and were a lifetime influence. At age eight, the problem arose of whether he should take karate which cost \$15 or Little League at \$10. The \$5 difference tilted the choice to baseball for the next twenty-three years until he retired from the profession at thirty-one.

He survived his mother's several marriages and a confusing number of siblings either of the half or step variety. A desire to please and to be a Super Hero were his motivations to excel in school. He played baseball, basketball, and football because they were the games that blue collar boys played. Also he learned not to run like a faggot because his coaches told him that was bad.

While in high school, he won a basketball free throw competition along with a trip to San Francisco for him and his parents. There he saw his first sign of homosexuality. Two men were walking down the street and holding hands without causing a stir. Such goings-on were never seen in the blue-collar suburbs of southern California which he inhabited and where the citizens were all "normal". A college athletic scholarship was his only way to escape.

Although excellent in basketball and football, Bean really starred as a center fielder and hitter in baseball. His 3.8 grade average and his athletic prowess made him the quarry of the coaches of several

California universities. Loyola Marymount was his choice. He was a success both as a student and an athlete.

There he meet the women whom he later married after a less formal arrangement. Apparently he really loved her. She was not the cause of his dissatisfaction with their marriage. In fact, she told the wives of other players that his bedroom performances were quite pleasing.

After college he was drafted by Detroit. His career was an up and down thing from the majors to the minors and back again with him being traded several times. He also played during the winter once in Venezuela and again in Mexico City. One summer he was on a team in Japan. Bean was never able to catch the golden ring.

Baseball players have worked hard to earn their reputation for womanizing. Bean lacked enthusiasm even though he participated in this off-field sport. When on the road, Bean usually just coped with his increasing homosexual urges. Maybe his reasoning was based upon the queer stereotype who is not an athlete, ergo, Bean, as an athlete, could not be queer. Lapses did occur. Once he took a taxi ride through the Castro . . . just a taxi ride. Another time he went into a pornography store. While he was sidling toward the gay section, another member of his team entered. Bean hid in a booth until the man exited. Having to participate in the frolics to avoid starting rumors about himself, he kept to a minimum his participation.

Escaping one such gala after downing eight beers, he told the taxi driver to go to a gay bar. Not only was he introduced to gay bars, but he also lost his virginity. The next morning he swore, "Never again!" As with so many vows, his words were written in sand. Another difficulty for Bean was learning that men can be romantically as well as sexually involved with other men. This false belief was rectified by his meeting Sam Madani, a refugee from Iran after the Shah's expulsion.

Sam was everything Bean wanted, intelligent, well educated, and an excellent cook. He was also ten years older than Bean, who considered this an ideal age difference. Sam took over the decorating and furnishing of a condo that Bean had

bought near San Diego. The explanation for Sam's presence was that he stayed with Bean while on business in California; even back in those days such an excuse must have been limp. For there were no weeds in their garden . . . just roses. Sam slowly acquired a knowledge of baseball, although he never understood why the hitters ran counter-clockwise. Bean's family easily accepted Sam with his aristocratic charm. Then Sam came down with AIDS. They had to wait excruciatingly for the results of Bean's test, which turned out negative. They had to wait for Sam to die.

Then Bean went to the Marlins in Florida. Again, he met another aristocratic refugee who was ten years older than he. Ephram Veiga not only did have these attributes, but he was also a restaurateur who was a good cook. Bean felt his baseball career was over, so he quit even trying to get a contract. Radio interviewing and other efforts were not a success.

They were going to open a new restaurant in Miami. Before opening, a newspaper reporter from the HERALD was intervening Bean about an article for the restaurant section. She casually asked whether she could mention that they were a pair. With little thought about the matter, he agreed thinking the news would appear only in the restaurant section of the paper. The reaction was as expected: pro, con, and indifferent.

As with most biographies, Billy Bean's has a moral. His story plainly illustrates that his being gay was not a choice but a painful recognition of fact. Of course the anti-gays will say he did not work hard enough to make the right choice.
