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BROTHERS FROM THE PAST

(I am resurrecting this vert interest series written by Cecil Bethea. This one was written in July, 2006).

Florence during the Renaissance was the center of European culture with artists and scientists of all types and abilities flocking there to gain the patronage of the Medici and other families who were earning great sums of money from banking, trade, and industry. Statistically, one may assume that Gays were there. Other evidence guarantees that we were there in great numbers. The preachers, in their thundering sermons, exaggerated that sodomites were the vast majority of the population. Europeans just knew that Italy, not a nation then but a geographical expression, was a hot bed of sodomy with Florence being the hottest bed of all. Germany "Florenzer" was an euphemism for a sodomite.

Sodomy in those good old days tended to mean any sexual activity other than with a woman in the missionary position with procreation as the goal. Recreational and homosexual sex were dire sins as well as all of the other sexual activities

Why were these people so concerned with homosexual sex? The Reverend Phelps was not the first preacher to win fame and fortune by damning Gays. The story of Sodom and Gomorrah had made a very strong impression upon Christians. Sodomy is the only sin for which all of the citizens of the towns were punished for the sins of a few individuals. From that time on, Gays became splendid scapegoats for all sorts of calamities that might beset a city one of the Medici eagerly signed a new and stronger law against sodomites after a crop failure and a nearby earthquake struck within the same year. During a hundred year period and several outbreaks of the plague, the inhabitants of Florence had dropped from about 120,000 to 40,000. The city fathers were anxious to increase the population. Rampant sodomy did nothing to achieve this goal. Also, the Florentines had a strange custom about marriage. The men usually did not marry until they were thirty. Then they married women about eighteen.

What were they to do during their randiest years? A common but illegal practice was to find a willing teen-age boy who was easy to find. The boy was supposed to be passive until eighteen or nineteen; then he was expected to become active. Of course variations, just as today, occurred, but they were frowned upon.

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The Florentines agreed they had a problem by establishing in 1432 the Office of the Night, an autonomous magistracy for the surveillance and punishment of sodomy. During the seventy years of its existence, about 17,000 individuals were incriminated but only 3,000 were convicted. For us its importance is that most of its records still exist.

Denunciations, interviews and trials give us at least a partial view of Gay life during this time. The Council of the Night was composed of sensible men who realized that the denunciations could be written for reasons other than morality. Most of this information was ignored. Another point of weakness was that the denouncer received a portion of any fines collected. During one period when all punishments were physical and not monetary, the number of denunciations dropped.

The punishment varied greatly. For the most part passives under eighteen were freed or punished lightly. One fifteen year old, who was considered excessively promiscuous was castrated. The a red hot iron was rubbed on the inside of his thighs. Surely the boy did not survive. Fines of money ranged from piddling to really hugh. We moderns would be surprised that also giving over kegs of wine was frequent. Of course lashing was frequent with the range being 10 to 50. Some miscreants were whipped through the streets while riding an ass and wearing a dunce cap. Exile from the city was common varying from months to a maximum of twenty years. The most extreme was burning at the stake. During a period of seventy years, seven burnings took place. Usually the victim was an older man who had committed sodomy along with other crimes such as robbery or murder.

Some families evidently encouraged their sons in their activities for varied reasons. A lower class family might pursue upward mobility by not objecting to the dalliance of a son with a member of the higher classes. Gifts, money, influence, jobs could come from such a relationship. Naturally others would practically pimp their sons. The records show that a few boys who were charged with sodomy later had sons. These sons often found their fathers accepting of their activities. No doubt experience bred tolerance.

The Medici were removed from office and the Republic was reestablished three times. This new government was much harsher than the Medici had been in passing out punishments, In fact, the Medici had been rather tolerant. A problem with judging a society by the ferocity of its laws is whether those laws are enforced. With the Florentines, they sometimes were fierce and at

other times lackadaisical.

What can we learn from the Florentines? They like other peoples punished us but not so much as some wanted. The monk Savonarola wanted all Gays to be burned or at very least exiled. Such an idea caused concern to city fathers who realized the importance of Gays to the city's economy. Their exile would have been most harmful to the city.

During the centuries when people have wanted to stamp us out, they have never realized that we keep on coming. In spite of fire, dungeon, and sword, we are still here. One small spark of hope still exists in their arsenal. Maybe sometime in the future, scientists will discover the Gay gene. Then we can be wiped out by abortion.

"A Life Full of Beautiful

Moments"

"A good life is a collection of beautiful moments." I'm not sure who said that. It's possible it was I who said it, but I doubt it. The quote is semi-profound, so my guess is that the author went to college. To me the quote means don't get distracted by your future or past, and enjoy the day-to-day moments.

I'd imagine that it is those moments that an old couple of partners, gay or straight, recalls as they sit in the shade holding hands.

All of us have experienced some "defining moments." That is when the nature of a person is revealed. One defining moment in my life was when as a young child a good friend told me if I stuck a St. Jude pendant in a light socket while the chain was around my neck, God would protect me from getting shocked. That moment defined my gullibility, my friend's cunning, and God's role as an observer of, not participant in, human folly.

There are also "decisive moments." These are the instances of making life choices, each with their own rewards and repercussions. For me a decisive moment was when, at the age of 34, I gave up my dream of becoming a career criminal in St. Louis and headed West to further a career in printing.

It is a shame that often the most crucial "decisive moments" arrive in the teenage years of a person's life when they are least able to comprehend the ramifications of their decisions. I have friends with teenage children who are praying their kids make better choices than they themselves did.

Looking back on decisive moments is pointless. The die has been cast, and there is no going back. Personally, I have made some good choices, like joining the Colorado Prime Timers organization; and I have made some poor choices, like investing in skis and bicycles, not real estate. In either case, you learn from, and live with, the results.

The precious moments, the ones we'll recall on our deathbeds, are what a good life is made of. They are profoundly personal, yet often meaningless to others. It is interesting, considering a full life of experiences; especially the ones that stay in your mind like a mental tattoo. As a boy, I remember clinging to my father's back like a wet monkey while he drove me around town on a motorcycle. I was about 10, and he smelled of Old Spice and Jim Beam.

A few years later, a friend and I climbed a drainpipe to the roof of an abandoned factory. We spit on traffic passing below us and smoked cigarettes stolen from my mother. I think that was the first time I had a sense of what it felt like to be a man

As I look back on the moments I hold precious, they are mostly innocuous instances. Ignored are the first kiss, the first lover, the first piano recital and cheap wine and bitter scotch debauchery. Instead in their places are moments of isolated encounters and clarity.

I'm not sure what actually makes moments memorable. My guess, for each of us it is different. I will say lately I've been trying to recognize them when they occur. This not only serves to intensify my recollections but also heightens appreciation.

A partnership produces many moments. I'll always recall when my partner (of 12 years) used my toothbrush to clean the acid-encrusted battery posts and terminals of his car and then put it back unwashed on my sink. I'll remember our meeting, some trips and anniversaries. But when I think now as I am older and balder, I remember more clearly the everyday instances . . . lying on the couch late at night, Ron next to me and our small dog Charmin curled snugly close to both of us. While it

happened without knowing why, I know now that we were having a moment. A memory like that can take the bad taste of brushing your teeth with battery acid right out of your mouth.

Not all moments are as profound as spitting on traffic or painful as sticking a pendant in a light socket, but they are the table of contents of our

I sincerely hope all of the members of the Colorado Prime Timers and the whole Prime Time organization across the US and other parts of the world, "find their life full of beautiful moments!"

You will receive a new Medicare card with a new Medicare number that is NOT based on your Social Security number. Begin using your new card immediately upon receiving it and destroy your old Medicare card.

Your benefits will not change with the new Medicare card. Your Medicare Supplemental Insurance provider is also prepared to process all claims using the new Medicare number.

You do not have to provide any information to Medicare or pay a fee to anyone to receive your new card. If anyone contacts you and wants money or personal information before you can receive the new card it is a fraudulent scam !!
